Supplementary Qualifications:



Check each vacancy to find out what qualifications the employer is asking for, some employers may consider you without and give you the opportunity to take the GSCE's as part of your apprenticeship.

Ounsure of a job area to go into? Consider applying for something that will give you some useful skills such as customer service, business admin or care. In apprenticeships like these, you can improve your communication, time management or build up your IT competencies.

Face to Face Interview - With just one person Panel Interview - Involves more than one interviewer Group Interview- more than one candidate being interviewed together Telephone Interview or Skype Interview Video Interview - responding to recorded questions that appear on a screen

- Know Your Kicks! What gets you up in the morning? What makes you happy? What are you passionate about? Which subjects do you really enjoy? What industry are you inspired by? Check out this <u>TED Talk by Noeline Kirabo</u> where she talks about how she did, and you can, identify your career passions
- See Your Skills! Consider what you are naturally good at, ask friends and family, look over feedback from your teachers and employers, make a list of your key skills and then look for ways that you can apply these to potential future jobs. - 3. Nail Networking! Social distancing doesn't need to mean that you can't communicate with people. Now is the time to reach out and to make professionally meaningful connections. Who do you know? Who do they know? Use the extra time you have to engage with people who are already working in the field that you want to enter. Set up a Linked in Account here
- 4. Perfect Your Portfolio! Especially relevant for those looking to get into the creative sectors- future employers and universities are going to want to know what you did with your creativity during lockdown. Why not devise a special project for yourself to document your lockdown experience in some way? The very least you should be doing is organising your files so that they are ready to show when the time comes- some good information <u>here</u> about doing just that.
