Course Information

Music technology plays a key role in music across the world. This course is designed to open up a range of exciting and useful tasks to a wide range of students, and to encourage you to learn about the subject. Students, including those who do not play a traditional instrument, are encouraged to explore their musicality and create original materials using technology. The college is investing substantially in the Performing Arts department, and as a consequence the Music Technology course has access to:

• a newly refurbished, fully equipped and acoustically treated recording

- · a newly refurbished, fully equipped and acoustically treated recording studio and control room, complete with full production versions of the latest DAW editing software
- · three acoustically treated music rehearsal rooms
- · Twenty one classroom PCs running the latest version of DAW editing software
- · A large variety of microphones, amplifiers, guitars, pianos and other instruments

The course is split across two years, taking up the same amount of time as a traditional A Level with the same UCAS points. You are able to mix this course with your other choices of A Levels or BTEC / Vocational Courses:

Areas of study

The qualification has been developed to:

- · give you the opportunity to enter employment in the music and music technology industries or to progress to higher vocational qualifications or study Music Technology at one of a huge range of Universities.

Chose these from 2 different genres.


Listening to the tracks, for each track, identify as many different components / instruments as you can and list them.

One should be a review for a piece of equipment and the other an article from the 'techniques' section of the site. You should pick articles which you think sound interesting to you, read them, and write short summaries (1 side of A4) of the content. Some recent articles will only be fully readable if you are subscribed to the magazine so chose ones where you can access the whole article before starting.
