A Level Preparation

This is a list of suggested listening to prepare you for the work that we will cover in the first year of A level. They are not prescribed works, and the lists are certainly not exhaustive, but these works are representative of the styles of the composers and periods we will be studying and therefore provide a 'taster'. It would be very useful if you were to do a little background research before listening to each piece so that you understand the context and are listening actively. Some of the works are quite long so you might find it easier to listen to a movement at a time until you become accustomed to appreciating longer works, however it is important to know, for example, the order and character of the movements of the complete work eg. the 4 movements of a symphony. You can find all of these works on You Tube. Wherever possible find a recording with score so that you can practise following scores (a key skill for A level)
