RECENT CHANGES TO A LEVEL HISTORY

All new A Level History specifications are:

- Assessed by a combination of examination & coursework.
- Linear, with assessment at the end of the second year.
- The courses must cover at least 200 years of History.
- Students must study breadth and depth units.
- Students must study British and non-British topics.

OUR APPROACH TO TEACHING AND LEARNING

At WSFC we offer two History Courses:

 Early Modern History (AQA): This covers the period 1469-1715. Students study Spain in the Age of Discovery 1469-1598; The English Revolution 1625-1660; Coursework on France 1610-1715

Or

(2) Modern History (Edexcel): This covers Germany & West Germany, 1918-1989; The rise and fall of Fascism in Italy c1911-46; Protest, agitation & parliamentary reform in Britain c1780-1928; Coursework on the Holocaust.

Students opt for either Early Modern **or** Modern History.

A LEVEL ASSESSMENT

On the <u>Early Modern option</u> (AQA) Students will be assessed by two written examinations and a piece of coursework.

Component 1: Spain in the Age of Discovery 1469-1598

Written examination (40% of the qualification)

Component 2: The English Revolution 1625-1660

Written examination (40% of the qualification)

Component 3: Coursework on France 1610-1715 (20% of the qualification)

On the <u>Modern option</u> (Edexcel) Students will be assessed by three written examinations and a piece of coursework.

Component 1: Germany & West Germany, 1918-89

Written examination (30% of the qualification)

Component 2: The rise and fall of Fascism in Italy c1911-46

Written examination (20% of the qualification)

Component 3: Protest, agitation & parliamentary reform in Britain c1780-1928 Written examination

(30% of the qualification)

Component 4: Coursework on Historical Interpretations: the origins of the Holocaust (20% of the qualification)

SUBJECT COMBINATIONS

History can be studied in combination with a wide variety of other subjects. In particular, it fits well with Politics, Geography, Sociology, Classics, Law, Religious Studies, Criminology, Business Studies and Economics.
