INTRODUCING A LEVEL POLITICS

All A Level Politics specifications for use in England are:

- Assessed by examination only
- Linear, with assessment at the end of the second year
- At WSFC we follow the Edexcel specification
- Year 1 introduces students to British Politics and some of its key issues. Year 2 is a more specialized, in-depth study of political ideas and Comparative Politics focusing on the USA
- Cover a broad range of relevant and contemporary ideas, institutions, processes and issues are to be covered

A LEVEL ASSESSMENT

Students will be assessed by three written examinations in the summer of Year 2.

Component 1 UK Politics

Written examination: 2 hours (33⅓% of the qualification)

Content overview

1. **Political Participation**, students will study: democracy and participation, political parties, electoral systems, voting behaviour and the media.
2. **Core Political Ideas**, students will study: conservatism, liberalism, socialism.

Component 2 UK Government

Written examination: 2 hours (33⅓% of the qualification)

Content overview 1. **UK Government**, students will study: the constitution, Parliament, Prime Minister and the government, relationships between the branches of government (Executive, Parliament, & Judiciary).

2. **Non-core political ideas**, students will study: one idea from the following: anarchism, ecologism, feminism, multiculturalism, nationalism.

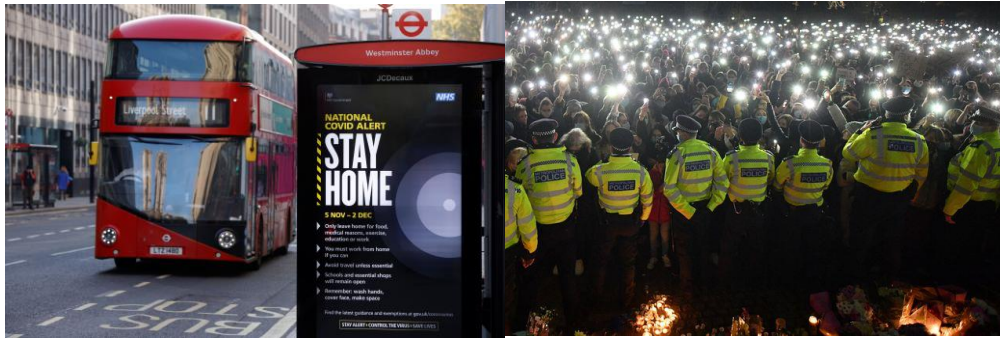
Component 3 Comparative Politics – The USA

Written examination: 2 hours (33⅓% of the qualification)

Students study **the government and politics of the USA**. This covers: the US Constitution and federalism, US Congress, US presidency, US Supreme Court and civil rights, democracy and participation, comparative theories.

SUBJECT COMBINATIONS

Politics can be studied in combination with a wide variety of other subjects. In particular, it fits well with History, Sociology, Classics, Law, Religious Studies, Geography, Economics, Business Studies, Criminology, Psychology and Environmental Science.



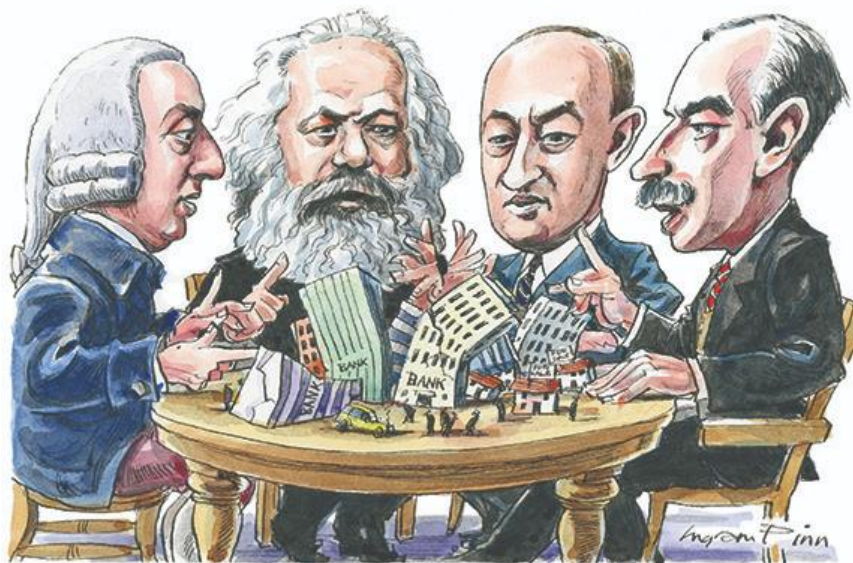
ENTRY AND SKILL REQUIREMENTS
