What is Psychology?





Psychology is... 'The <u>Science</u> of <u>Mind</u> and <u>Behaviour</u>'

- A science A level
- The study of mental processes e.g. thinking, memorising, what thinking errors we make.
- But also observable behaviours e.g. aggression or autism
- Scientific and mathematical 10% maths skills
- Involves lots of content and written work

A very broad subject with many different areas



Aims to explain why most people do, and think the things that they do



There are many misconceptions about this new subject!

- It will involve lots of debating and practicals







What is the difference between GCSE and A Level?



Difference from GCSE Psychology

- For many of you, A Level Psychology will be a completely new subject (you do not have to have done GCSE Psychology)
- Much more depth than GCSE Psychology
- You will need to be able to evaluate in much more detail
- You will need to apply knowledge to new situations
- There is a lot more maths

Here in the Psychology department at WSFC we have dedicated psychology rooms which house useful resources and interesting displays.






You will be provided with the most essential resources...




The Psychology teachers write booklets of notes that are designed precisely for the AQA specification. This means that you don't have to take notes.

Formal Assessment 1: Research Methods Year One Psychology

A researcher wanted to find out if recording different types of everyday experiences affects happiness. She obtained an opportunity sample of 40 students aged 16 and 17 years. She asked them to record in a diary particular events that occurred over a period of two weeks. The students were randomly allocated to one of two conditions.

Condition 1: students were asked to record pleasant events.

Condition 2: students were asked to record events that had upset them.

At the end of the two weeks, all the students were asked to rate how happy they felt on a scale of 1 to 20, where 1 means very unhappy and 20 means very happy.

Twenty primary school teachers were sent by their individual head teachers to attend a training course in classroom behaviour management run by educational psychologists at a local university. Before the training course, and again after training, the teachers were asked to say how confident they were in managing difficult classroom behaviour.

The researchers compared the before and after answers to see how many teachers rated their confidence as 'better', 'worse', or 'the same' as it had been at the start of the course

The results are shown in Table 1 below:





- 4. What findings were obtained and/or what conclusions have been drawn?
- Does this research have any practical applications could the findings from the study be useful in any way? If so, how and for who?
