## Time to Talk Day

Thank you to everyone who got involved in this year's Time to Talk day that we held last half term. Although it was a particular day to highlight the importance of talking about mental health, I would encourage you to do so all the time. Continue to look out for your friends and family and speak to us at college if you are struggling. Just a reminder that all pastoral tutors, the safeguarding team, learning support assistants and Lin Bingley have completed mental health first aid or mental health champion training. Also 3 of our teachers, Elisha Burner, Joe Black Ardy and Sam Price, have recently completed mental health awareness training.

Our next national event is Mental Health Awareness week 9 - 13 May which we are already planning for. We would like to have activities running all week so please get in touch with me if there is anything you would like us to consider. We are hoping for the return of the therapy dogs in college that week so watch this space!

### Mental health peer support training

### Survey about sexual harassment

Before Christmas we sent out a survey about sexual harassment and 313 of you responded. The survey asked you to consider whether you knew what form sexual harassment could take, whether you had experienced or witnessed sexual harassment and, if so, whether this was reported. Whilst it is positive that those of you who said that you had experienced or witnessed sexual harassment felt that the College

responded appropriately, it is disappointing that 81% said the incident had not been reported.

As a consequence of your feedback and, further to discussion with our student Safeguarding Focus Group, we have been able to identify the following priorities:

- Promoting ways to report sexual harassment so that everyone feels confident that any concerns will be taken seriously by the College;
- Installing CCTV in the cafeteria
- Delivering tutorials on sexual harassment, healthy relationships and consent
- Offering personal safety sessions later this term
- Working in partnership with local schools and colleges, the Sports Centre, Police, a local Councillor and Worcester's Safer Streets team.

# Knife Angel, Worcester

And finally.... as many of you will be aware, the Knife Angel is in Worcester in Cathedral Square until the end of March. The Knife Angel is a national

monument against knife crime, violence and aggression. The sculpture, made from over 100,000 seized blades, was specifically created to highlight the negative effects of violent behaviour whilst solidifying our critical need for social change. Not only does the Angel act as a catalyst for turning the tide on violent and aggressive behaviour, but it is also acts as a beautiful memorial designed to celebrate those lives who have been lost through these violent and thoughtless actions.
