- 2. Research and write down the definitions of the key concepts: crime and deviance.
- 3. In September, you will be studying Unit 1 Changing Awareness of crime. The first part of this unit will involve studying the following types of crime:
 - White collar crime
 - Moral crimes such as vagrancy and prostitution
 - State crimes
 - Technology crimes such as identity theft
 - Individual crime: honour crime
 - Individual crime: hate crime
 - Individual crime: domestic abuse

Tasks:

- a) Choose three types of crime from the above list and for each one research, read, and summarise one news article. This should be 300 words maximum in total.
- b) For each of the above categories of types of crime: research and write down: the definition with an example, typical victims and typical offenders. Write 100 words for each type of crime.
- 4. Members of society sometimes campaign on an issue to bring about change.
 - a) Research one of the following campaigns and write down: Why was the campaign set up and by whom? Campaigning methods used. What was the success of the campaign? Maximum word count 200 words.
