	<b>Top strategies for final exam preparation (students should already have consolidated their course notes and flash cards)</b> <b>Law Revision Techniques</b> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Practice tests in and out of exam conditions , check answers against mark schemes</li> <li>2. Spaced practice – practice tests &amp; revise legal rules spaced out over time</li> <li>3. Explain to your neighbour – explain legal concepts &amp; ideas to others</li> <li>4. Self-explanation – write legal rules linking learnt new information learnt to existing knowledge</li> <li>5. Interleaved practice – move from topic to topic used timed sprints (25 minutes or more)</li> <li>6. Summarising – write summaries of the law</li> <li>7. Highlighting – read and highlight key information in a timed sprint (25 minutes or more), ideally then link to test</li> <li>8. Mnemonics – creating phrases, memorable words – good for cases, definitions</li> </ol>

9. Text into image – good for case names  
10. Re-reading – good for areas where missed previous lessons, ideally use tests before and after re-reading

**Answering technique: application questions**

1. Read passage and question to decide on scope of question.
2. Introduce topics.
3. Explain the law that the question requires using statute where relevant and regular case references. All legal rules should be referenced.
4. Complete separate paragraphs for actus reus / mens rea completing actus reus first and defining key mens rea terms eg intention, recklessness.
5. Apply relevant laws fully to the scenario question and make explained conclusions as to culpability.
6. Finish with conclusion.

**Answering technique: evaluation questions**

1. Read question to decide on scope.
2. Introduce topics.
3. Explain the law that the question requires using statute where relevant and regular case references. All legal rules should be referenced.
4. Complete separate paragraphs for actus reus / mens rea completing actus reus first and defining key mens rea terms eg intention, recklessness.
5. Evaluate law(s) fully with 5 evaluative points in 5 evaluative paragraphs which also include case/ statute references and well developed points.
6. Make reference to possible reforms and evaluate these.
7. Finish with conclusion.
